Ridgefield Continues to Grow, Additional Services Coming Soon

Driving through Ridgefield, you won't travel far without seeing new construction, and for good reason: Ridgefield has been experiencing unprecedented growth. With approximately 14,000 residents, Ridgefield has grown 35% since 2019. Even during the height of the COVID-19 pandemic in 2020, the City issued 85% more new home permits than the previous yearly record.

While the pace of growth is a big change, and under State growth laws the City can't prevent it, it WAS planned. In 2016, City Council adopted a comprehensive growth management plan based on data projecting a population of 25,000 by 2035. The plan governs where different types of development occur in the city and establishes goals for residential and employment densities. It also considers the transition from heavy residential growth to a more sustainable, full service live-work-play community. We are now seeing this transition occur in real time. Housing starts have slowed significantly in 2022, and projects bringing services and jobs for Ridgefield residents are ramping up. Costco, Clark College, Tractor Supply, Les Schwab, Haarup's new Headquarters, and a YMCA are just a few of the employers and services that are coming. Police Chief John Brooks Retiring for a Walk in Memphis

Ridgefield Police Chief John Brooks is retiring from the Ridgefield Police Department effective October 3. He and his family will then be putting on their blue suede shoes, boarding a plane, touch down in the land of the Delta blues, in the middle of the pouring rain. Walking in Memphis, as Head of Security for a Naval Base in Western Tennessee.

Chief Brooks has served as Ridgefield's Police Chief since October 2016, after 26 years in the Portland Police Bureau. Since joining Ridgefield, Chief Brooks has led the police department's almost doubling in force, while recruiting and retaining high-quality personnel who continue to serve Ridgefield residents well. Chief Brooks also led the creation of key safety initiatives including Neighbors on Watch – a community volunteer program to empower and train local residents to help extend the efforts of Ridgefield's Police Department by being the eyes and ears for safety in their communities. The program started with 6 volunteers in 2018 and has since grown to 36 active NOW members.

"Police work is a people business with success being measured by how you were able to help. I've truly enjoyed and appreciated the opportunity to help the great people here in Ridgefield," shared Chief Brooks.

Ridgefield Lieutenant Cathy Doriot will serve as the interim Police Chief. A Ridgefield native, Lt. Doriot has served the Ridgefield Police Department since 1989.

National Night Out

We recently celebrated our 17th year of National Night Out here in Ridgefield. It was a great time for our community to connect with each other and the Ridgefield Police Department. In addition, the Police volunteer group, Neighbors On Watch (NOW), were present with all the Ridgefield officers.

National Night Out was launched as a crime prevention program in 1984 in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania as a way for people to take back their neighborhoods by gathering in the streets and turning on their house porch lights to celebrate their power to control events in the community. National Night Out eventually morphed into neighborhood parties focused on safety. In Ridgefield, it has become one of our largest community events where public safety and community building is the focus. Our “end game” is to continue to build an atmosphere where neighbors look out for neighbors, and one where the police are an approachable and connected part of the community. If you didn’t make it this year, we hope to see you next year.

During the August First Saturday Day of Festivals, Ridgefield hosted its second City Days. This year's event focused on the Public Works Department with a Dozer Days type display of a plow, street sweeper, flail mower and vacuum truck; and, of course, hard hats for kids who climbed on the big rigs.
