## Prepare for Road Construction Season

The return of summer sunshine in the PNW also means a return of roadwork.

To ensure our investment in new roadway pavement and application of preservation methods lasts, our crews need warm, dry weather, leaving a relatively small window of time to perform this work.



This year, you can expect to see road projects all around Ridgefield, including pavement preservation projects, the construction of new roundabouts and widening of Pioneer between Royle Road and 56th Avenue, and various other projects on city, county and state roads.

We try to schedule work at night or other off-peak times and encourage contractors to minimize full and partial road closures as much as possible, but some impacts to travel time are unavoidable. ## Project Highlights

### Police Department Drone Program

The Ridgefield Police Department's top priorities are your safety, security, confidence and comfort. We are implementing new modern technology designed to increase the safety and effectiveness of our police investigations, while ensuring residents privacy and security. ### Pioneer Widening and 50th Avenue Roundabout

The City will be improving traffic capacity and flow, and improving multi-modal transportation along Pioneer Street between Royle Road and Interstate 5. When completed, there will be a four-lane roadway along Pioneer Street from just west of Royle Road to I-5, and a new east-west collector roadway (Pioneer Canyon Drive) connecting 50th Avenue to an extension of 56th Place. These projects will be completed prior to new businesses opening in the adjacent developments. ### Waterfront Park Master Plan

The City is teaming up with the Port of Ridgefield to create a vibrant waterfront park along Lake River. ## Meet Your Newest Council Member: Katie Favela

City Council appointed Katie Favela to fill a mid-term vacancy after a rigorous and competitive process that included a detailed application, public forum, and interviews with City Council. Favela was appointed on April 11 and has already been an excellent addition to the Council. She will stand for election in November 2025 to retain the seat through the remainder of the term.

Council member Favela is a social worker who has served as chair on the Planning Commission and volunteers with the Boosters, Ridgefield School District Equity and Engagement Board, and welcoming host family for the Ridgefield Raptors. On her application, she emphasized the importance of community, *“A strong community generates a participatory energy that makes residents feel integrated and empowered... This sense of community brings out the best in people, and inspires them to do more for themselves and those around them.”* Welcome to City Council, Katie Favela!



## Your Dollars, Your City: Transparency in Action

 Financial transparency is critical for local government as it fosters accountability, trust, and informed decision-making among residents. The City of Ridgefield recognizes this importance and has built financial transparency and availability of information into our systems and practices.

One transparency initiative is the publication of a Popular Annual Financial Report (PAFR), which simplifies complex financial information for the public who may not have a background in finance. Ridgefield has published PAFRs for fiscal years 2021 and 2022, and

Other financial transparency efforts include an online Transparency Center and Digital Budget Book. These tools provide easy access to budget details with easy to understand, interactive charts. The City takes pride in publishing a budget document that meets the highest principles of governmental budgeting and has earned an award for Distinguished Budget Presentation for seven consecutive years. ## Downtown Parking on Our Busiest Days

The Ridgefield Farmers Market, new splash pad, numerous restaurants and food carts, and community events are sure to draw crowds into our historic downtown this Spring and Summer. The lack of parking available in our Downtown Core Area can be a challenge on these busy days. The City has been working with Downtown merchants, residents and Ridgefield Main Street to create additional parking capacity in the downtown core by adding spaces, creating turnover in existing high demand spaces, and helping visitors locate public parking.

The proposed plan would add an estimated 20-30 spaces in the Downtown Core Area and encourage turnover with strategic time limits in high demand spaces. In the meantime, keep these tips in mind the next time you head downtown during a busy event:

- Carpool if possible, travel with family members or neighbors to minimize the cars in the area.
- Check the event website for parking instructions. Many events have designated parking areas and some even have buses or trolleys arranged to transport people from parking to the main event.
- Be prepared to have to walk a couple of blocks: arrive early, locate a drop off spot closer to the event for any passengers with mobility challenges, bring your patience.
