Bee Happy: Native Plants Thriving at Davis Park

If you're looking for ideas on how to incorporate native plants into your garden, swing by Davis Park for inspiration! Thanks to the Ridgefield Garden Club, you'll find two beautifully replanted flower beds along with educational signage to guide you.

Last fall, Garden Club volunteers transformed the triangle and west berm flower beds at Davis Park, replacing non-native species with a vibrant selection of native plants. The chosen varieties support pollinators and other local wildlife, and they're well-suited to Ridgefield's climate—meaning they thrive without the need for extra watering.

This spring, as the new plantings enter their growing season, the Garden Club has installed informative signage throughout the beds. Visitors will find labels identifying individual plant species as well as displays explaining the importance of native plants and their role in supporting pollinators.

The Ridgefield Garden Club hopes these public displays will inspire residents to bring native plants into their own yards. Even a small garden can make a big difference, creating valuable habitat and food sources for bees, butterflies, and birds.

"I feel incredibly fortunate to raise my family in this vibrant, growing community," says Favela. "I love serving on City Council because I have the opportunity to give back to the same community that has poured so much into my family."


National Night Out TUESDAY, AUGUST 5
